My husband, sister and I offered to watch Carol Herbertz's dogs while she was visiting her gravely ill father. I had no concept of what Carol's involved daily routine was like until I tackled it myself. Over time this caring and compassionate woman has taken in many dogs. Everyday, twice a day she feeds, and walks and cleans up after her canine charges. Carol's capacity for love is so huge that it could easily accommodate any number of dogs. When you have been around Carol for any length of time you will hear her say, "Oh what a sweet dog. Does he need a home? Put him in my car, please." This lady is small in stature but her heart is very big!

Last year, at a club camp-out I sat down next to Christina Curtis. It only took a few moments of listening to her describe her heart-wrenching but rewarding days spent at the animal shelter to acquire an overwhelming admiration for her. She has and is continuing to save many, many dogs from euthanasia. Christina's passion for helping unwanted dogs takes on several dimensions. She volunteers her dog training expertise to those who can't handle their dogs and are about to put them down or in a shelter. Her own Captain Jack has endured four homes and four rejections before Christina smiled upon him. amazing woman has rescued 80 dogs in a two and half year's time. She is a shining example of caring and compassion to her eleven year old son Chandler. When you're beside

Christina you automatically walk a little taller.

If you're at a disc dog competition you can't help noticing Tracy and Adrian Custers' canine brood. They have a magic touch when it comes to working with dogs. That talent is laced with a large dose of love, compassion and caring. Verbs you will read throughout this article. In all, Tracy and Adrian live with eight dogs plus one foster dog. Six of them are dogs they have rescued and have made into disc dog champions. That's what love and caring can do. I asked Tracy why she rescues dogs. She said, "Since 2001 I had done rescue off and on. It was 9-11 that really brought home the sobering truth that life is too short. It was then that Adrian and I became more involved in the rescue process. There are so many needy and abandoned dogs out there. I feel with a little love and patience they could make awesome companions."

Mary Jo Corso and Rick Kimball are a husband and wife team in the strictness sense of the word. When Rick married Mary Jo she was a cat person. He introduced her to the dog world through his dog Gus. It's been a non-stop canine love affair ever since. In 1990 they began volunteering at the local Humane Society. When Rick and Mary Jo adopted their Lab, Murphy Brown, they began a rewarding association with Adopt-A-Lab. My Lab, Rocky, came out of Mary Jo's dedicated efforts through Adopt-A-Lab to find him a good home. Rick and Mary Jo were dedicated volunteers for the Katrina Animal Rescue Project. Mary Jo takes her job in the animal medical field down several rewarding avenues beyond the confines of her work place. Her many humanitarian endeavors on behalf of sick and needy dogs are enormous. Rick and Mary Jo are presently fostering a special

Lab named Mellow. This Lab was a hairs breadth away from losing his leg. Mary Jo didn't think twice about taking Mellow to the veterinarian specialists at work. They were able to save his leg. This is just one example of her devotion and compassion for animals in need.

Charter members Margaret and Marshall Smith hail from the small town of Stamping Ground, KY. It boasts a population of 566. Margaret has been heard to say, "Marshall and I have had dogs and cats forever it seems." Their home is filled with so much love for these faithful creatures. That love led them on a rescue journey that saved three of their dogs from a life of misery and possible death. Dylan, at four months old, was found shivering and frightened at the side of the road. The Smiths scooped him up and took him home. Bo was abandon by his irresponsible owner and put into a shelter. For many dogs this is the last stop in life. Along came the Smiths to save him. And then there is Bud.

I will never forget the day Margaret told me about this dog. The tears I shed while listening have never gone away. They are inside me now but they are there. It seems Bud was a family dog for several years. His family had adopted two little girls from Romania. These children


New Kid In Town

In the Year 2000 a Disc Dog Club Comes to Indianapolis

When you put two young married and enthusiastic people together with a fever for the sport of canine disc you are creating an embryo for success.

As a child, Ron King was intrigued with the Frisbee Dogs in the beer commercials. He grew up with dogs and he always wanted a dog that could do something. So as an adult he revisited his childhood fascination for the Frisbee. He purchased a

disc and worked diligently with his dog. It took awhile but his patience finally paid off. He and Amy now had a disc dog they named Montyboy. Now it was time to take this hobby to a higher level. Ron and Amy were eager to see what Montyboy could do in competition. There was no place in Indy to do this so they would have to travel. This soon became expensive and time consuming. Ron and Amy took their knowledge and experiences with disc dog and decided to form a disc dog club in their hometown of Indianapolis. They thought this would give people the opportunity to compete with their dogs without traveling long distances. On May 20, 2000, the Kings created a partnership. Ron came up with the name Indy Dog and Disc Club. The club had it's first

event at the Gilmer Bark Park in Eagle Creek Park. Montyboy soon became a shining star on the field. They were on there way. In January, 2002, the club became incorporated and held it's first board meeting in the Hebrew Nationals meeting room. Among those present were Reva & Richard Moody, Jim & Beverly Scheidt, Marshall and Margaret Smith, Greg Million, Carol Herbertz, Bill Marion, Bill Camp, Mare Potts and the Kings. Their success in officially bringing a new, exciting sport to their hometown was now realized. We now have our own trailer to transport our equipment. We enjoy a state of the art sound system that brings our events to the public. We have a social calendar that rivals the Queen of England. We enjoy training camps, playdays, camp-outs and an impressive disc dog event schedule. The club hires the top disc dog experts twice a year to oversee two of our training sessions. We have many of the top disc dogs and handlers in our club. We stage Demos throughout the disc dog season. Our club board members are constantly bringing new things to the table to keep IDDC fresh and exciting. We are proud to say we have a reputation of being one of the top disc dog clubs in the USA.

Ron and Amy bring a plethora of experience to the sport. Ron has qualified for the Skyhoundz World Finals twice by winning the North Central Regionals in both 2000 & 2001. He qualified for the USDDN Finals in 2002. He was the IDDHA's number one ranked Freestyle Team in 2002. He won the Michigan State Championship in 2003. He placed second and third in a number of events, including the Georgia State Championships and the Florida State Championships. He also holds the World Record for distance thrown to a small dog, Scout, belonging to Mare Potts. He set the record July 27, 2002 at the IDDHA World Championships and it is 211'10" (70 yards 1 foot 10 inches) or 64.57 m.

Amy has competed in the 2001 Skyhoundz World Finals. She and Chaos placed 5th in the 2002 IDDHA World Championship. Amy competed in the 2003 U S Disc Dog National Championship Semi-Finals. She and her dog Bogey won the 2004 Microdog Skyhoundz Open Regional. This win qualified Amy and Bogey to compete in the 2004 Microdog World Finals. Amy King is the IDDC Event Coordinator and she excels in this position. Without her, the Club would be stuck on hold with nowhere to go.

Today the Indy Dog and Disc Club boasts a membership of 40 strong but after the first two events of the season, the number grows to between 60 & 70. With all their success Ron and Amy still manage to keep the club's motto "Where Having Fun is More Important than Winning" their first priority.

Parasites are "freeloaders" that live in or on another creatures.

Fleas are the most common external parasite found on dogs. Although fleas are more likely to be a problem during warmweather months, they can also cause problems during cooler seasons due to their ability to continue their life cycles indoors.

How will fleas affect my dog?

You will probably first notice the effects of fleas when your dog repeatedly scratches and chews. On occasion, you may actually see tiny brown fleas moving quickly through your dog's haircoat. Your dog's constant scratching may lead to visible patches of hair loss and reddened, irritated skin. Fleas may also cause skin allergies and can transmit other parasites, such as tapeworms, to your dog.

How do I prevent my dog from getting fleas? **Indoors**

To control fleas, you must stop them from reproducing. Carpets, pet bedding, furniture, and other indoor areas where your dog spends much time will contain the highest number of developing fleas. Frequent vacuuming of these areas and frequent washing of your dog's bedding can greatly reduce the number of developing fleas inside your home.

Outdoors

Fleas also develop in shady, protected outdoor areas. These outdoor spots can easily be identified as the places where your dog like to rest and relax. Remember, if your dog does not feel comfortable spending time in a particular area, then neither will fleas. Dogs and fleas typically like the same locations.

Steps to Take

Both indoor and outdoor areas can be sprayed with insecticides to eliminate fleas, if necessary. Treatment of your home or yard is best performed by a trained pest control expert.

Most flea problems can be managed by treating and preventing fleas on your dog. It is important to keep in mind that flea problems may be different from pet to pet or between households, and each problem may require a special method of control.

See your veterinarian for advice on your specific situation. Your veterinarian can recommend safe and effective products for controlling fleas and can determine exactly what you need. Your veterinarian can also determine whether you should consult with a pest control specialist about treating your home and yard.



It's All in the Fundamentals



Toss n Fetch, Mini-distance, Single disc, or whatever you choose to call it is a game of retrieve. Teaching your four legged partner the fundamentals first will make

the game more fun and help you rack up a score that brings home a medal.

Tr All the steps necessary to teach the retrieve take longer to write and to read than we have room for here. There are many good resources for positive reinforcement methods out there. One good one is the book Dog Training for Dummies by Volhard. It will teach your dog to retrieve even if they have zero interest. The actual teaching part is easy.

Many of us get started in canine disc because we discovered that our family pet could catch a disc. But to our dismay our dreams of our pooch running long for the big catch and coming straight back and giving us the disc are often dashed to pieces. They don't catch the disc or pick it up. They don't come straight back to us. They play keep away. They tug and won't give up their precious trophy. So then we search for band-aids for each defect. It is better to back up to the beginning and teach the retrieve from ground zero.

Such a simple thing, right? Nope. This game is actually made up of several tricks that your dog must master individually. She has to pursue the object, pick it up, bring it back to you, hold the object, relinquish it, and then wait for more directions. Luckily all dogs like to retrieve. Some dogs just haven't discovered it yet. Successful retrieving is addictive.

If your dog is not a good catcher yet don't worry. Teach catching separately. Establish a solid retrieve first. Teach it with several objects including a disc.

Here is the basic process. Find a quiet place indoors without distractions. First you will teach the "take" command. Next you will teach the "give" command. We then move on to teaching "go get it", then "bring it", and then we add "give" once they bring it back. Use your favorite book or video on exactly how to teach the steps especially if your dog is reluctant or confused. Some dogs learn in smaller steps for certain tricks. Remember to make it fun.

Next increase the distance gradually. If your dog refuses go back to a shorter distance. Take your training outdoors to a quiet place after many successful repetitions indoors. Start with short distances and gradually increase the distance. After many successful repetitions move to another location with a few more distractions. Again start with short distances and gradually increase the distance. Repeat at several locations. Do not increase the distraction level and increase the distance at the same time.

This method will make the retrieve habitual and is your best insurance for a good round in competition. Best of all it lets you celebrate many small successes along the way and make your dog feel like a winner!

suffered from Attachment Disorder, which is a severe and destructive behavioral problem. The girls were allowed to torture Bud. Finally one day Bud had enough and lashed out on a neighbor's child by biting her. The child's father retaliated by kicking Bud's front teeth out. This dog's fate was on shaky ground until he looked into the eyes of a quiet caring and kind man named Marshall Smith. At that very moment Marshall became his savior. It took a lot of time, love and patience before Bud would trust the Smiths Today Bud and Marshall are inseparable. Bud has rewarded Marshall with his love, trust and companionship. And by being one helleva disc dog.

Natalie Moore has been a member of IDDC since 2004. Natalie opens her home to foster rescued dogs. When a dog finds a new home in another city or state, many times it needs a way there. Natalie often contributes her time and gas to transport these dogs on one leg of their journey. Over the years she has rescued many strays. She remembers one in particular – a 3 week old puppy that she found in a burlap sack. He was destined for drowning. This compassionate lady brought the beagle pup home and bottle-fed him every two hours. Her caring gave this pup a second chance in life.

Belgium member, Sjoukje Janssen, who now resides in Milton, Ohio, brings an international flair to IDDC. She joined our club in 2003. Since Sjoukje was a little girl in Belgium she has been a champion of dogs in need. She also has a place in her heart for her beloved horses. Sjoukje combines her love for dogs and horses in her rescue efforts. She does this by transporting needy dogs and horses part way to their new homes. I asked Sjoukje why she involves herself in animal rescue. Her answer is "Because I can. I truly care and feel I can make a difference for animals in need. I have made it my purpose in life."

What is there to say about Greg Million that no one knows? So what everyone knows bears repeating. All a person has to do is look like they need help and he is there. He is a kind, generous, giving and compassionate man who has made a large difference in many dogs' lives. Let's start with one of his own dogs, Lizzy. She came to Greg with an advanced case of heartworm and wasn't expected to live. Greg didn't accept that diagnosis. He was determined to see that she survived. Thanks to his involvement Lizzy is alive and well. Lizzy is now one of the clubs disc dog competitors. He was a huge help in the Katrina rescue efforts. Greg also has fostered many dogs, and finds it very rewarding.

On any given Saturday or special event day you will find Don and Alice Lang at the Animal Care and Control Center (Dog Pound) located on South Harding St. They give a major part of their time to helping the poor animals housed in this city owned animal shelter. They have been volunteering there so long that now they have a title. They are the Center's Adoption Coordinators. They rescued their Aussie, Lily, from this facility. Many people have asked Alice how she can endure volunteering in such a depressing place. With a warm smile she always answers, "It is so gratifying to see the good we can do here. These poor animals desperately needs our help. Every dog we can help place in a good home is one more reason to be here.

In doing this article there were two common denominators with all my interviewees. They all grew up with dogs and they have been helping needy animals since they were children. A tribute to family values. There are many members not mentioned here who have these same values. They give their hearts, time, money and homes to helping animals in need.
