

# The Second Annual Show Me State Disc Dog Championships

October 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> of 2010

At Purina Farms in Gray Summit, MO (near St. Louis)

"Another month of this dry weather and it will look like The Road Warrior around here." That's what I was imagining. As awesome as that would be, it's not the best situation for the Show Me State Disc Dog Championship field. The grass was half brown and the ground was like baked clay. A week before the big event I checked the weather forecast; thunderstorms Saturday and Sunday. I checked the forecast each day for six more days and the prediction did not change.

Friday night I went to bed thinking, "It hasn't rained in 6 weeks. Why would it this weekend? Well... we will see the devoted disc doggers tomorrow."

The storms split to the South and North of us during competition hours both days. It was nearly as epic as the Jewish lamp that lasted for 11 days – but for disc doggers, we were the chosen. As I was putting the last few tents and other items away late Sunday night I watched three giant thunderheads flash brilliantly as they loomed on the Southern horizon. As if they were the Disc Dog Gods themselves looking down on the Show Me State Field. Then all hell broke loose and the rain came in sideways all night.

But the reason to hold such an event is for the competitors (human and canine). We opened up registration Saturday morning for the love of the sport and the dogs that love doing it. We were met warmly by many of our favorite disc dog friends from Indiana, Michigan, Illinois, all over Missouri, and a guy from Alabama with a dog named The Edge. We were also met with a beautiful morning.

After registration closed Saturday we met our first problem. I couldn't find my CD of the National Anthem, so Tracy ran to the house and burned one to CD...Then with everyone holding their hands over their hearts, half way through the Star Spangled Banner, my CD Player ran out of juice. (My bad...) Well, what do you do when that happens? You start singing it! And that is just what 40+ people did. I think we sounded pretty good too.

First of the five events was Funstyle:

- Don Lang and Lily through down a round that put his Saturday Night Fever at the NC Regional to shame.
- Chandler Curtis with Loco and Fury took the cake by getting 9s from the judges.
- Danielle O'Neill and Millie 2 were as cute as a button and used the "Common' Barbie Let's Go Party" song that stuck in my head for a week afterward.
- In the Novice Division Sharon Galema and Cliffy came out in costume and demonstrated some skill, they have been practicing and certainly were having fun.

Second was Team Time Trial, Ohio Rules:

- Teams of three handlers each with their own dog had to make three 20 yard+ throw and catches and complete it in the shortest time.
- An unlikely team of strangers win! Chandler Curtis and Fury (Indy), Ed Tuxbury and Lola (St. Louis), Ryan Hartman and Dally (Springfield, MO) took the top award with a two round combined time of 86.06 seconds.
- Team Curtis from Indy took second, and the fabled Border Patrol brought in bronze.

#### Third was Timed Course:

- The novice teams went first. They rocked it! This game is not easy, pro players were judging them and we couldn't wipe the smiles from our faces.
- Doing it well in both rounds proved to be the challenge this year.
- Novice Team Kathleen O'Neill and Wilson scored a two round time of 64.94 seconds that would have had them finish second in the Pro Division.
- Darron Barrus and The Edge had the best one round time of 14.85 seconds, smoking!

Saturday night we gathered around as the KCDD fired up a delicious chili dinner. STLDD brought the dessert as a 3 gallon tub of ice cream. Later, the camp fire by the tents was almost too warm, but that didn't stop many of us from staying up too late while shooting the breeze and throwing back a bunch of cold ones.

Fourth was Long Distance Throw and Catch:

- Men and Women in Novice and Pro Divisions "Grip it and Rip it!"
- Women's Novice Competitor, Michelle Blumenthal, had a mighty 50.2 yard throw earning her gold.
- Last year's Men's Pro Champ disappointed almost everyone with scores of zeros in his first round with both of his dogs...that was me...
- Darron Barrus took the Men's Pro Gold with The Edge and also had the longest throw and catch of 86.5 yards to Newman the whippet.

#### Fifth was Throw and Catch:

- A Novice field of twenty teams came down to a sudden death throw off for first place, won by a local. Congratulations Lon Weekly and Bailee.
- Pro had a tie too, but for second place. Darron Barrus with The Edge and Danielle O'Neill with Wilson dueled it out. Danielle the winner of the sudden death throw off won Silver.
- Congratulations to a (Shocked) Jackie Sheetz and Towser from Kansas City, MO taking Pro Gold.

Keeping a watchful eye on your pet's teeth will help you catch problems early. The following are the most common signs of oral disease:

- Yellow-brown tartar
- Bleeding Gums
- Red, inflamed gums
- Bad Breath
- Difficulty chewing
- Change in eating habits
- Pawing at the mouth

#### Fido's First Aid Kit



- Clean Towels
- **Duct Tape**
- Saline irrigation solution (like you would use for contact lenses)
- Gauze and cotton bandaging material
- White medical adhesive tape
- A muzzle appropriate for your pet's mouth
- Antibiotic ointment like Neosporin
- Hydrogen peroxide

This is new IDDC member Ann Briggs' beautiful and heartwarming account of one of her many animal rescues and the bias obstacles she encountered and conquered along the way. Ann is a retired schoolteacher and a active octogenarian. She is also a member of the Indiana Obedience Training Club. She and her dog, Daisy, participate weekly in Community Hospital East Indianapolis pet therapy program.....Editor.

When my 20yr old sweet Ginger dog grew older, she no longer wanted to be bothered by my young Cairn Terrier, Cappy. I understood her loss of desire to play. It was then that I decided to begin looking for a suitable playmate for Cappy.

Each day I scanned the newspaper thinking there might be just the right dog needing a home. Well, there wasn't any I felt would fit into our clan at the time. This went on for perhaps a year. Looking for a suitable canine to join our flock got to be discouraging. I then went on-line and decided to haunt Petfinder. I was just about ready to give up my search when one day the very first picture I saw was a three year old mixed breed named Lucy. She was looking through a chain link fence. Her eyes were riveted directly on me...mine on hers. Tears welled up into my eyes, as I knew she was what I was looking for. I will never forget how those eyes haunted me, seemingly asking for adoption.

The next day, I e-mailed the organization that had rescued Lucy, asking if this dog was still up for adoption. YES they replied! I filled out adoption papers on-line the very next day. A few days later, I received an e-mail from that organization. I was being questioned about my age. It was felt that perhaps I was too old to adopt a dog. This is the first time that my age was in question for any reason. I e-mailed the lady I was dealing with and said: "I was quite capable of adopting a dog," and then gave her a stack of references. After several references were sent, evidently I was worth the risk because an e-mail followed a few days later saying "come and get Lucy."

I asked a friend if she could accompany me to pick Lucy up. My friend and I met Lucy and a gentleman from the organization at a local shopping mall. He took Lucy from his car on a lead. He told me her name was really Daisy. The minute she saw me, she broke away from the man and headed straight to me! Instant bonding. As I drove, my friend held Lucy/Daisy on her lap all the way home. It was love at first sight. I decided to keep her original name, Daisy. Both Daisy and I bonded like epoxy glue. Cappy wanted an instant playtime with Daisy. At first Daisy would have nothing to do with him. When Cappy ran to her, trying to get her to play, Daisy tried to bite him!! She also went after Dugan, my cat. Dugan sat Daisy on her heals. No explanation needed.

I e-mailed the rescue group that I obtained Daisy from asking why Daisy was so afraid of other animals and felt she had to defend herself. That's when I learned Daisy was born in a puppy mill. When she was old enough she was bred every time she came into heat. Daisy never left her cage the three years before I rescued her. It was in her third year that authorities shut the mill down due to its deplorable condition. The owner of the mill put Daisy and her four puppies in a box and threw them over a fence near a river. About three days later, someone found her and her babies still nestled inside in the box. These wonderful people took their discovery to The Humane Society. Daisy and her babies were there a few weeks before a foster home was found. When arriving at her foster home, 7 large foster dogs were there to greet her. She constantly found herself fighting them off in an effort to protect her puppies. She was then put in a crate AGAIN until the puppies were weaned. It was then I decided to rescue her and went to Cincy to bring her home with me. Knowing her history made it understandable when she tried to defend herself from Cappy and Dugan.

I enrolled her immediately into an obedience class in hopes she could be socialized. It worked! After a year of training, Daisy's defensive behavior melted away. She got a certificate for passing beginners class, and moved into advanced training. She was able to go through the whole advanced class routine without me giving her any voice commands. She still has those eyes on me at all times and can follow nothing but hand signals for all commands. It took a while, but she and Cappy play together now. After Daisy passed a temperament test, plus an obedience training test, she became a member of Community East Hospital's pet therapy group. The group visits with patients each Thursday evening. She loves this activity and is a great little therapy dog. She still goes to advanced obedience classes. In May 2010, we went out to the airport, where the Bichon Nationals were being held, and Daisy took the Canine Good Citizen test in a parking lot. I thought she might get distracted being in a parking lot. My fingers were crossed. Daisy aced that test and earned a huge ribbon, a patch, and a tag for her collar. Daisy and I are working on passing the National Pet Therapy test and earn another badge.

Here at home, Daisy is the flower of my life! She still does not like to be too far away from me at any given time, but she is doing better in regard to adding other humans to her list of pluses! Daisy's birth date is unknown, so I decided to celebrate her big day on the day I rescued her, July 27<sup>th</sup>. Daisy will be 5yrs old this summer. She and I now belong to a great organization, the Indy Dog and Disc Club. Life just got better! Daisy is a smart dog who learns quickly. She will always be the light of my life. Not only because of her intelligence, but in being herself. There are many folks who aren't as fortunate as I because there isn't a Daisy in their lives. It makes me very, very happy to be able to share life with such a wonderful canine companion.

Arrive at the competition early and sign-in/register on time.

Always clean up after your dog!

Listen for the order of competition, and be ready to go when it is your turn.

Walk your dog to and from the throwing line on lead.

Always respect every competitor's dog's space.

When you are finished with your round, gather your dog and leave the field quickly.

Never let your dog off lead near the competition field, unless to compete.

Never allow anyone, especially a child to be eye level with your dog, no matter how docile your dog may be.

Always walk around the competition field, never across it.

Never talk to judges while they are working. Wait until they are not judging and talk with them then.

Keep your dog under control at all times. You are always responsible for your dog's actions.

Don't walk your dogs through other people's tents, be careful & courteous.

These are family events, keep negative emotions and inappropriate language under control.
