August 9th is the **Canine Cavalcade/Bajure' Memorial Competition** at Canal Park in Delphi hosted by Bill Marion. This is always a fun event. In addition to the regular toss—n-fetch and freestyle formats, Bill has some rockin' games that will test your disc aim and precision, along with your sense of humor as you try to toss your disc through a suspended hoop,

Challenge! Updog is a new canine sport, just started in 2014, and IDDC wants to get in on the action. Updog combines fun disc games (think Skyhounds Disdogathon) and agility for all playing levels. As in agility where you progress through different levels over subsequent meets, your Updog "points" are tracked so it is a personal challenge as well as friendly competition between competitors at each event. Instructors from the Updog Challenge Team will be coming in to help IDDC get the first meet started and show us the ropes. The first event will be at West Park in Carmel, registration at 8:00 and games starting at 9:00. Since this is a new sport to everyone, there will be info and practice runs starting August 17. It certainly has been a great summer for disc playing. The weather has been awesome (ok, so there was some rain) but we've been able to avoid the 95+ degree temperatures of 2013 where events had to be shortened because of the heat. The **Indiana Disc Dog Classic** at the Fishers Freedom Festival on June 28-29 was a bit wet and muggy (if you ever

wonder what it's like to play in a rain forest, that weekend was a close approximation) but it didn't stop the 31 pro teams from five different states, some as far as Colorado, from strutting

their stuff in style. Saturday was the UFO Major, and Gary Duke and Chris Sexton flew in to judge and share their expertise. Founded in 2000, the UFO literally has events all over the world. Points are accumulated by competitors which enable the top teams to play in the World, European, and North American Finals at the end of the year. Watching the teams on Saturday was awe-inspiring to say the least. Andrew Han and his dogs Solar and Psy took the top two spots in the Open Combined, but not without a fierce battle from Christie Campbell and Star Spangled Banner. Watching Kevin Eroskey and Merlin from Georgia bring in 36.5 points in the Toss & Catch round was like watching a fine-tuned machine in efficiency and speed.

Sunday was the **Ashley Whippet Invitational**. The top four teams from that day would qualify for the World Finals in Illinois at the end of August. What a great year for that honor, as this is the 40th anniversary of the birth of our beloved sport. Ashley Whippet (named so for his color and after the character Ashley Wilkes in *Gone With the Wind*) made his promotional debut when he and his owner, Alex Stein, jumped the fence at a Dodgers game and proceeded to display Ashley's amazing speed and jumping ability to the point the game was stopped and the crowd was mesmerized and enthralled. Alex was subsequently arrested and fined, but not before his passion ignited others to join him and get the ball rolling with the first official toss and

fetch competition held the next year. 40 years later the crowd was wowed at Fishers Freedom Festival to see players like Andrew Han (and Psy), Nate Bednar (and Rizzo), Jeff Duff (and Sasha), and Rick Rawerda (and Riff Raff) compete and win those top four spots. People attending the Festival stopped to watch and cheer and talked about it afterward. It was also to see some of the new moves and routines that newly minted pro players were bringing to the field. Jill Best recently moved up from intermediate, but her successful foot toss to Logan had the judges roaring in approval, as well as cheers from the teams on the sidelines.

Last weekend was the **Itty Bitty** in Frankfort, Indiana. If you are wondering what the Itty Bitty means, think WIENER DOG!!! The whole town celebrates that day, and they invite IDDC to join in. It's also a great venue for the newbie players as the competition is only toss and fetch, with free-style demos if you want to participate. This year the added bonus was a petting zoo that was moved next to the playing field at the last minute. I think if you can keep your dog playing Frisbee while a goat and a chicken are next door, you deserve a trophy, even if he doesn't catch anything. More than one dog decided to go sniffing a few feathers that day!

**Speaking of toss and fetch**, it seems fairly simple at first. Stand behind the line, throw the disc to your dog, dog catches said disc and returns it to you. Repeat this as often as you can in the next 60 seconds to get as many points as possible. Right? Well......that's a good place to start, but getting as many points as possible in extremely tight competitions involves a bit more, to say the least! If you watch the competitions, you can see where those handlers

(and dogs) who are extremely proficient at this part of the game have an edge over other competitors. One of the experts in this area is Mark Gose, whose disc not only sails out smooth, even, and FAR, but his dogs have a great return. Mark has been helping out some of the IDDC members, and below is some of the tips he shared with us that you might find helpful if you are needing work in this area.

- 1) Get your practice discs, and keep them bite-free and just for you. Mark said he invested in 30 discs that he keeps in a special bag. His dogs will never touch them, and when not in use, he stores them out of the sun (i.e. not in a car) so they don't warp.
- 2) Practice a LOT and WITHOUT your dog. He heads out to a field with his dog-free discs and marks out a comfortable distance. (Beginners might want to start with 10 or 20 yards.) Throw your 30+ discs in a row, paying attention to each throw and analyzing what went right and wrong. Once you can reach the short distance accurately and with a smooth delivery, increase the distance.
- 3) When you add your dog to the practice session, make it as much like a competition as possible. There's nothing wrong with throwing to your dog for fun in the back yard, but your practice sessions need to be more regulated. Mark walks Colt out on a leash, makes him sit, and even nods to an imaginary line judge before sending him around his legs. The only thing he does differently is setting his timer for 90 seconds instead of the usual 60. He doesn't want Colt to anticipate the end of the time and slow down, and this helps keep him going full throttle for 60 seconds. When the 90 seconds is up, Mark likes to reward him with his favorite tug or toss. At competitions Colt also gets a treat in the tent which not only rewards him but gives him energy to last the day.
- 4) Finally, when in a competition, keep your mind focused on your throwing and not on your dog. If you have trained him, he'll know what to do, and his job will be easier if you concentrate on your job of placing that disc in the best spot possible for him to catch it. It really is a team effort, and part of being a team is letting go and trusting your teammate!

There is a lot more to the toss & fetch than can be included in a newsletter, but hopefully these are a few hints that you can add to your practice sessions that just might give you those extra points and a more competitive edge!
